They have the opportunity to deepen their understanding within specific disciplines while also developing the ability to approach problems and topics from an interdisciplinary perspective. This approach prepares students for the dynamic and interconnected nature of the real world, where complex challenges often require a combination of knowledge and skills from diverse fields. Encouraging multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary

approaches at all levels of UG and PG programs demonstrates the college's commitment to fostering well-rounded individuals with a broader intellectual outlook. It equips students with the ability to navigate and contribute to interdisciplinary collaborations and paves the way for their future success in various professional domains. The Institute pedagogy is framed and structured in alignment with the policies and directives issued by the National Education Policy 2020 (NEP-2020) and the Government of Maharashtra (GoM). This alignment ensures that the implementation of multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary approaches is in line with the broader educational goals and visions set by these governing bodies. This demonstrates a commitment to providing students with a contemporary and relevant education that meets the evolving needs of society.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) has been established in alignment with the National Academic Depository (NAD), which serves as the backbone of this initiative. NAD securely holds students' academic data and academic awards within the DigiLocker system. The primary objective of ABC is to streamline the credit transfer process, promoting greater mobility for students across educational institutions. This system offers a standardized framework for recognizing and valuing academic achievements, thereby enhancing the flexibility of educational pathways. ABC facilitates students in registering and initiating credit transfers, simplifying the process of switching institutions or engaging in interdisciplinary studies. Despite its functionality in credit registration and transfer, the ultimate outcome of credit redemption is determined by the specific academic policies of the participating institutions. The Academic Bank of Credits, as framed under the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, has been comprehensively reviewed by all concerned criteria in-charges and faculty members. The implementation is set to commence in the 2023-2024 academic session, in accordance with government directives. To date, more than 850 students have successfully enrolled in ABC, marking a significant step toward formalizing this progressive educational reform.

17.Skill development:

The college has implemented several initiatives and measures to nurture and inculcate skill-based training and development for students. Let's take a closer look at each of these measures:
Skill Development Programmes: The college aligns its skill development programs with the framework designed and recommended

Incubation Centre: The college has established an incubation center to promote and encourage startups and entrepreneurship among students. This center provides support and resources to students interested in starting their own ventures.

Activity Room for Hands-on Training: A separate activity room is dedicated to hands-on training for skill development and enhancement. This room provides students with a practical learning environment where they can apply their theoretical knowledge and gain hands-on experience.

Workshops in Collaboration with MSME: The college organizes regular workshops in collaboration with the Ministry of Micro, Small, and Medium Enterprises (MSME), Nagpur. These workshops aim to motivate and encourage students to take advantage of various government schemes available to support startups and small businesses. By aligning with the NEP-2020 framework, establishing an incubation center, providing hands-on training facilities, and collaborating with government organizations, the college ensures that students have access to a comprehensive skill development ecosystem. This approach equips students with the necessary skills, knowledge, and support to excel in their chosen fields, fostering their entrepreneurial spirit and enhancing their employability prospects.

20.Distance education/online education:

for Slow Learners are as follows :

biodegradable. Degradable waste, such as food and canteen waste, is disposed of through the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC), while organic waste from trees and shrubs is processed in a Vermi Compost Bed and converted into usable manure.

To ensure effective management of solid, liquid, and e-waste, the institute has implemented the following practices:

1. Waste Segregation and Disposal

The institute follows a systematic approach to waste management by separating biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste. Degradable waste is managed through the NMC, while non-degradable materials are handled appropriately to minimize environmental impact.

The institute relies on the established drainage system of the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) for the management of sewage and wastewater, ensuring proper treatment and disposal.

The institute comprises faculties in Humanities, Social Sciences, Commerce, and Management. The majority of the waste generated is biodegradable, with only a small portion being non-biodegradable. Degradable waste, such as food and canteen

waste, is disposed of through the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC), while organic waste from trees and shrubs is processed in a Vermi Compost Bed and converted into usable manure.

To ensure effective management of solid, liquid, and e-waste, the institute has implemented the following practices:

1. Waste Segregation and Disposal

The institute follows a systematic approach to waste management by separating biodegradable and non-biodegradable waste. Degradable waste is managed through the NMC, while non-degradable materials are handled appropriately to minimize environmental impact.

2. Wastewater and Drainage System

The institute relies on the established drainage system of the Nagpur Municipal Corporation (NMC) for the management of sewage and wastewater, ensuring proper treatment and disposal.

3. E-Waste Recycling and Awareness

E-waste, including items like old computers, office equipment, solar panels, and generators, is collected and disposed of through a certified vendor. The institute has an MoU with M/s Suritek Butibori, Nagpur, for responsible recycling. Additionally, students are educated about the environmental risks of e-waste and encouraged to collect and return any e-waste they encounter in their local communities for proper disposal.
